As you know, the City has contracted with Bob Murray and Associates to conduct the recruitment for Fire Chief.

Our Recruiter, Fred Freeman, is very pleased with the response for this job opportunity, and has confirmed that we have a very strong pool of candidates.

Our final count is 35 applicants, which includes 23 Fire Chiefs/ Deputy Chiefs/ Assistant Chiefs/ Division Chiefs, seven Battalion Chiefs, and five Consultants with past command level experience.

Mr. Freeman is currently conducting preliminary interviews. He expects to interview between 10 - 12 candidates, and then present up to six recommended semi-finalists to the City during the week of Jan. 26th.

The City will then interview those recommended finalists. We will conduct two panels to fully assess the finalists: a technical panel of Fire Executives from other agencies and a panel comprised of Garden Grove management and employee representation. The result of these two panel evaluations is expected to provide you with the top 2 or 3 candidates for you to interview. You have indicated an interest in involving the City Council in evaluating the finalists in some capacity and I look forward to your direction in this regard.

FOR NOVEMBER 2014

Enclosed is the November 2014 Investment Report which shows the financial institutions, types of investment instruments, monthly transactions, current month interest received, and the par and fair market value of investments held. The month-end cash in the bank and petty cash balances are also listed on the Cash and Investment Report. The pie chart reflects the investment instruments as a percentage of the total portfolio.

This investment portfolio meets State guidelines and adheres to the City investment policy. As of November 2014, the City invested 26.643% of its total portfolio in treasury securities and 50.541% in federally backed securities. 17.411% of the portfolio or \$32.021 million is invested in the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) managed by the California State Treasurer. A portion of the investment portfolio is restricted as they are funds held and invested by an outside fiscal agent. The restrictions were set forth in the related bond indentures. As of November 2014, 5,404% of the portfolio is restricted. Please see chart on attachment A.

In summary, the investment portfolio is secured and the City has the necessary cash to pay its bills for six months in a timely manner.



OBJECTIVE

To provide information to the City Council regarding an anticipated allocation from the Garden Grove Disposal Community Donations Account to support a dinner reception for visiting students and chaperones from our Sister City of Anyang, Korea.

DISCUSSION

For the past 25 years, the City of Garden Grove has worked to foster friendship, understanding and cooperation with its Sister City in Anyang, Korea. This has been accomplished through support of the Sister City Association and annual student exchange program, various business meetings, as well as participation in a public employee exchange program.

From January 17 through January 25, a delegation of 10 high school students and two chaperones from Anyang, Korea will once again be visiting Garden Grove. Typically, a dinner reception for the students would be held at the Community Meeting Center in advance of a City Council Meeting in which the City Council would present the students with honorary citizenship certificates and some small City of Garden Grove mementos.

Since a City Council meeting is not scheduled during this year's visit, the president of the Sister City Association has requested that the City host a dinner reception with the students and their chaperones at Carolina's restaurant on West Street in Garden Grove on January 22. To support the reception, the Sister City President has requested an allocation from the Garden Grove Disposal Community Donations account.

Absent any objections from the City Council, staff is planning to submit an allocation request for a not to exceed amount of \$750 for approval by Central Management, in accordance with the City's administrative procedure for use of these funds. PROCEDURE FOR REQUESTING FUNDS FROM THE GARDEN GROVE DISPOSAL COMMUNITY DONATIONS ACCOUNT

<u>PURPOSE</u>: To establish a procedure for requesting funds to supplement community activities from the Garden Grove Disposal Community Donations account.

Excerpt from Solid Waste Disposal Agreement, Section 11.6: Republic Services shall make a payment (each year of the contract term) of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to City to use for community programs of any nature as City deems appropriate, including, but not be limited to, public holiday celebrations, public concerts, youth activities, senior citizen programs and continuing education classes.

REGULATION:

- 1. Requests for funds will be managed and distributed by the City Manager's Office, subject to approval by Central Management. The point of contact to request funds is through the Deputy City Manager.
- 2. Funds will be used to supplement community activities throughout the City.
- 3. Due to the broad range of community programs that are carried out or supported by the City each year (e.g., Christmas tree lighting celebration, youth and senior programs, Public Works Open House, Fire Services Day, National Night Out and many others) requests will be limited to Departments within the City organization and will not be open to outside groups.
- 4. Funds will be allocated to support programs that provide broad community benefit.

OBJECTIVE

To provide information about the City's membership in the League of California Cities (LOCC) and Association of California Cities-Orange County (ACC-OC) and advise the City Council regarding continued membership for 2015.

DISCUSSION

The LOCC is an association of California city officials who work together to enhance their knowledge and skill, exchange information and combine resources so that they may influence policy decisions that affect cities. In 2014, the League achieved success in the Legislature and the courts, and it engaged City officials across the state through regular publications, conferences and meetings, webinars and other in-depth resources. The ACC-OC serves as a regional advocate for public policy and local control both locally and in Sacramento. Among the ACC-OC's offerings are legislative advocacy for cities, education programs for elected leaders and staff, best practices and policy guidelines, and research services on issues confronting cities.

The City of Garden Grove has been a member of the LOCC for many years (with a break in membership for budgetary reasons prior to 2009) and has been a member of the Association of California Cities since its formation in 2011. Staff recently renewed the City's membership in the ACC-OC for 2015 and is planning to renew membership in the LOCC for 2015, later this month. Membership dues for calendar year 2015 are \$31,636 for the LOCC and \$28,166 for the ACC-OC. Funding for renewed membership in both organizations was approved by the City Council in the FY 2014-15 Budget.

2015 Strategic Goals

How does the League determine the organization's top issues?

Every year, the League's members and leadership work together to set strategic priorities for the next 12 months. These goals focus our legislative and advocacy activities and serve as a powerful tool for advancing local control.

2015 Goals

Meeting in joint session Nov. 13-14, 2014 in Sacramento, the officers and directors of the divisions, departments, diversity caucuses, policy committees and board of directors of the League of California Cities adopted the following strategic goals for 2015:

- Expand Economic Development Tools and Reduce Regulation. Advocate for new tax increment financing and other economic development tools, and support reductions in burdensome and overlapping state regulations, to support job creation and a stronger economy.
- 2. Implement Additional Pension, Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB) and Related Reforms to Help Reduce Unfunded Liabilities and Insolvency Risks. Support responsible implementation of recent pension reforms by CalPERS, and urge the adoption of additional pension, OPEB and related reforms by the legislature and cities to better manage the long-term growth of unfunded pension and OPEB liabilities and reduce the risk of fiscal and service level insolvency by cities.
- 3. **Modernize the Financing of Critical Infrastructure Maintenance and Construction Programs.** Provide state and local governments with new and innovative revenue options and resources to finance critical infrastructure maintenance and construction needs for our transportation (streets, roads, rail & transit), water supply, wastewater, stormwater, and other critical infrastructure systems.
- 4. **Update the Local Government Tax Structure to Respond to the "New Economy."***Consistent with the constitutional protections for property, sales and local taxes contained in Propositions 1A and 22, develop policy options, where feasible, for responding to the

erosion of the major local government revenue sources resulting from the expansion of e-commerce, increased consumption of retail services rather than goods, changing patterns of commerce, and innovations in technology.

*The **new economy** is the result of the transition from a manufacturing-based economy to a service-based economy." Examples include online retailers, mass customization manufacturers (e.g., 3D printing), social media, sharing economy companies like Lyft, Airbnb, etc., online media companies, etc. For more information on how the new economy has affected sales tax receipts, for example, see "The Fiscal Challenges Ahead for Cities," Western City, November, 2014.

Board of Directors

Also seated on the League Board of Directors are the mayors or designees of the 10 largest cities by population and an additional 12 selected at-large members with one position reserved for a representative of a city with a population under 12,000. Policy Committees

The League's policy-making process engages city officials to shape statewide policies that affect local government. Approximately 50 city officials serve on each of the League's eight policy committees, which are:

- Administrative Services;
- Community Services;
- Employee Relations;
- Environmental Quality;
- Housing, Community and Economic Development;
- · Public Safety;
- · Revenue and Taxation; and
- Transportation, Communication and Public Works.



Advocacy Tools and Resources

Legislative Advocacy

Legislative advocacy is a primary function of the League. An experienced Sacramento-based lobbying team works in tandem with regional field staff to advocate on behalf of cities on a wide spectrum of issues. The League drafts, sponsors and supports legislation that assists cities. It also opposes or seeks amendments on legislation that would undercut local authority or revenue. The League often forms coalitions with other local government associations and interests to advocate for common goals. League lobbyists take positions on hundreds of bills annually, focusing heavily on priority measures that affect city interests.

Legislative positions are governed by the League's policy and guiding principles that reflect positions developed by the League's policy committees. Final authority for determining the organization's positions on controversial legislation not covered by the platform rests with the League Board of Directors. Legislative Advocacy Webinars and Events

Throughout the year several legislatively-focused meetings provide League members with information on breaking developments in the Capitol as well as tips for advocating on behalf of cities. These events include periodic webinars conducted by League lobbyists, several legislative receptions, Legislative Action Day (which focuses on pending issues) in the spring, and the fall Legislative Briefings, which cover recently enacted legislation.

Regional Divisions and Public Affairs Managers

The League's 16 regional divisions cover every corner of California and play an essential role in the League's advocacy efforts. City officials in each division work closely with a regional public affairs manager to implement grassroots activities in conjunction with specific legislative, regulatory or ballot measure goals and develop local informational programs. Division members also help raise private funds for CitiPAC, the League's political action committee, which supports the League's ballot advocacy efforts. Each division appoints representatives to the League Board of Directors, resolutions and policy committees. Legal Advocacy

The League also advocates in support of cities before the appellate courts through the Legal Advocacy Program because laws affecting cities are made in the courts as well as in the Legislature. The League weighs in on legal issues where its participation is likely to help advance the legal interests of all California cities. The League receives guidance on its amicus curiae or "friend-of-the-court" efforts from the Legal Advocacy Committee. This committee comprises city attorneys from throughout the state. To more effectively use limited resources, whenever possible the League joins forces with other local agency associations to help achieve legal advocacy goals. League Litigation

Protecting local control authority reserved to cities by the California Constitution is an important priority for the League. When legislative actions weaken the constitutional safeguards provided to cities, the League is prepared to support cities that challenge these legislative efforts in the courts and, when appropriate, bring lawsuits directly in the League's name.


Ballot Measure Advocacy

California has a very robust initiative process where voters help shape major statewide policies. Because of this, the League is positioned to engage in ballot measure campaigns where local government interests are at stake. Such campaigns include defending against efforts to erode local control and revenues. Since 2004, the League has successfully fought to protect local control through the initiative process, passing and defeating key ballot measures such as Proposition 1A (2004), Proposition 22 (2010), No on 90 (2006) and No on 98/Yes on 99 (2008). The League has also supported measures that would expand or protect funds for transportation, infrastructure and affordable housing.



CitiPAC

The League's successes at the ballot box are possible only through the support of CitiPAC, its political action committee that focuses solely on initiatives affecting cities. Fundraising through CitiPAC helps ensure that the League has the necessary resources to advocate for city interests on ballot measures and defend against threats to local democracy. Conferences


League Website

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
Benefits of Membership in the League of California Cities



Founded in 1898, the League is the leading local control advocate for California's cities. Through the League, cities collectively marshal the resources to defend and expand local control in the Legislature, at the ballot box, in the courts and through strategic outreach to inform and educate the public, policymakers and opinion leaders. League engagement has provided and protected hundreds of millions of dollars in revenue for cities in recent years and preserved local control against many threats to the land-use, employee relations and other authority of cities. All this is possible only through the collective involvement of virtually every city statewide.










Among the many significant benefits cities receive from their League membership are:

Legislative and Ballot Measure Advocacy. A team of Sacramento-based and 16 field staff work with city officials to advocate for local control and secure fiscal resources for cities in both Sacramento and Washington, D.C. The League helped lead successful ballot measure campaigns in 2004, 2006, 2008 and 2010 that protected local tax funds and land-use authority.

Member-Driven Policies and Services. League policies and priorities are formulated and established by mayors, council members and other officials from member cities who serve on the League board of directors, policy committees, divisions, departments, caucuses and task forces.

Legal Advocacy. The League conducts an active legal advocacy program in support of California cities. Members may request amicus support in cases to which they are a party if statewide interests are at stake. During 2011 and 2012, the League participated in 94 cases on behalf of member cities in federal and state courts, in addition to 10 requests for formal review and input from the California Attorney General. The League also filed lawsuits to challenge the constitutionality under Propositions 1A and 22 of the 2011 diversion of Vehicle License Fee funds from cities and the sales and property tax clawbacks in the 2012 redevelopment budget trailer bill.

Discounted Conference/Seminar Registration. Members receive deep discounts (\$1,000) on registration fees for conferences and seminars, including the League Annual Conference & Expo, the City Managers' Conference, City Attorneys' Conference and other yearly meetings.



Leadership Opportunities. Elected city officials and staff from member cities may serve on League policy committees, the board of directors (staff representing their professional department) and as officers of the diversity caucuses. Staff may hold a leadership/ officer position in their professional department, and elected officials may serve as officers of the League's 16 regional divisions.

Information. The League invests in comprehensive research on both city fiscal matters and other issues by conducting strategic surveys and substantive analyses of policy. Sponsored by the League, the League's fiscal consultant Michael Coleman publishes extensive data, statistics and analyses of California city and county finance, tax election results and more at the California Local Government Finance Almanac (www.CaliforniaCityFinance.com). League surveys focus on important city policies such as compensation, fiscal priorities, local services and more.

Research and Best Practices. The Institute for Local Government (www.ca-ilg.org) is the League's nonprofit research and education affiliate that promotes good government at the local level with practical, impartial and easy-to-use resources for California communities.

Publications. The League's publications, such as Open and Public IV; The People's Business; The Municipal Law Handbook; and The Proposition 218 Implementation Guide, are considered the definitive sources on critical aspects of city government operations. The League's annual City Hall Directory provides contact information for every elected city official and key city department heads.
