Enclosed is the August 2018 Investment Report which shows the financial institutions, types of investment instruments, monthly transactions, current month interest received, and the par and fair market value of investments held. The month-end cash in the bank and petty cash balances are also listed on the Cash and Investment Report. The pie chart (please see chart on attachment A) reflects the investment instruments as a percentage of the total portfolio.

This investment portfolio meets State guidelines and adheres to the City's investment policy. As of August 2018, the City's total portfolio is invested in:

The cash with fiscal agents is restricted as they are funds held and invested by an outside fiscal agent. The restrictions were set forth in the related bond indentures. As of August 2018, 7.799% of the portfolio is restricted.

In summary, the investment portfolio is secured and the City has the necessary cash to pay its bills for six months in a timely manner. Please call me at extension #5060 if you have any questions.

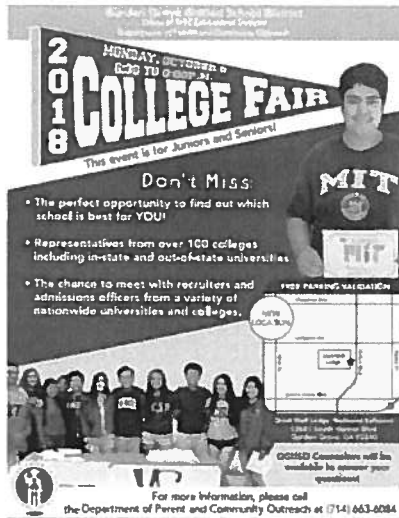
UCI Cancer Researcher

Fire fighters responded to the 11600 block of Stephanie Lane for a residential structure fire shortly after 1:00 p.m. today. The first arriving engine company reported fire and heavy smoke showing from a house with fire extending to an adjacent home. Crews initiated an attack of the fire and a search for residents. It was later discovered that the resident, a female in her 80's, had gotten out prior to fire department arrival without injury. Due to the large volume of fire and two houses affected, a second alarm assignment was requested. It took almost 40 fire fighters from Garden Grove and surrounding jurisdictions to get the fire under control 45 minutes later.

Garden Grove fire investigators were on scene. It was determined that the cause of the fire was accidental, and it could not be ruled out that either an electrical failure of an appliance or faulty use of extension cord were the cause. The first house that caught fire was a complete loss. Damage is estimated at \$400,000 to the structure and \$75,000 to contents. The adjacent house exposed suffered approximately \$35,000 in damages. Both left a total of five people displaced. The Red Cross was requested to assist. Assistance was provided by Anaheim Fire and Rescue, Orange County Fire Authority, and the Orange Fire Department.

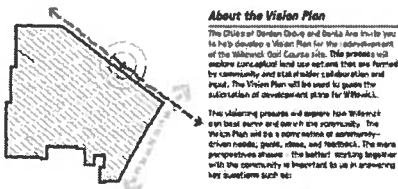

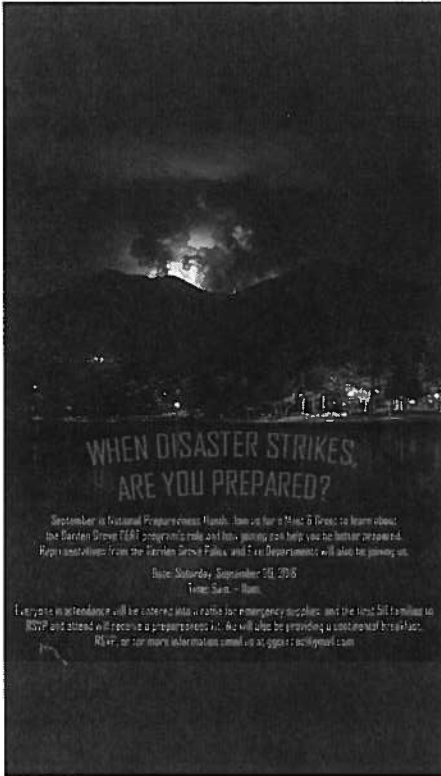

Jack Wallin, the first superintendent of Garden Grove and the force behind the Strawberry Festival, dies at 88

GARDEN GROVE » Jack Wallin left his fingerprints on every park in Garden Grove. So it's only fitting that his memorial will take place at KiwanisLand.

Wallin, 88, died Friday after a brief bout of pneumonia. He leaves a legacy grounded in playgrounds — and in fun.

As the city's first superintendent of parks, Wallin co-founded the Strawberry Festival. Celebrating its 60th anniversary this past May, Wallin rode in the parade as grand marshal.

Among more traditional parks, Wallin helped design and birth dreamlike Atlantis Play Center, which still retains its '60s vibe. "We wanted something unique, something that nobody else had," Wallin told the Orange County Register in 2013, the park's half-century mark.

That 40-foot dragon slide and King Neptune sculpture? Wallin and his crew built them. "It's not generally known, but back then we (recreation staff) made all the equipment in the park," he said.

Wallin always had an eye toward compassion, said daughter Shannon Watermolen.

Decades back, he created a special day earmarked for children with disabilities to enjoy the Strawberry Festival — and continued to organize it every year forward, including 2018. As always, on the Thursday before opening day, Wallin welcomed almost 2,000 children with special needs for free carnival rides and ice cream.

"That was the one thing he was most proud of," Watermolen said. "My dad had a huge heart."

Wallin designed KiwanisLand, as well, with inclusion in mind. The three-

acre park features campgrounds, a man-made mountain with a waterfall and a lake in which kids can paddle small rafts.

"He wanted a place where boys and girls from urban areas could camp and enjoy nature in a safe environment," Watermolen said.

Until an illness left him weak earlier this year, Wallin visited KiwanisLand every day and helped out with maintenance as a volunteer.

"It was his special place," Watermolen said.

Still, Wallin is best known as an instrumental force behind the Strawberry Festival. Over the years, the community fundraiser grew to attract around 250,000 attendees every Memorial Day weekend.

In its younger days, the festival's parade attracted big-name participants in-

cluding Jayne Mansfield, Zsa Zsa Gabor, Pat Boone, Jimmy Durante, Mel Blanc, Steve Martin, Jane Powell, Meredith MacRae, Debbie Reynolds, Lorne Green and Nancy Sinatra.

The most unforgettable guest of honor was Sen. Bobby Kennedy, who rode in the parade June 4, 1968 — the day before his assassination at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles. "He was very nice to everybody, re-

ally charming," Wallin recalled in a recent interview.

Wallin predicted that the Strawberry Festival would be around for another 60 years.

"I'll be gone," he said, "but it will still be here."

Wallin is survived by his wife, Marge, three children and six grandchildren. His memorial service will be at 1 p.m. Friday at KiwanisLand, 9840 Larson Ave., Garden Grove.

\$220.5M contract awarded to build OC Streetcar

A rebuffed bidder vows to sue, but work is expected to begin
this year on the line between Garden Grove and Santa Ana

The first modern streetcar project in Orange County is expected to break ground by the end of the year, after county transit officials

on Monday hired a construction firm to build it for \$220.5 million.

Orange County Transportation Authority board members voted to award a contract to Walsh Construction, whose bid was the lowest of two that agency officials said met the project requirements.

OCTA spokesman Joel Zlotnik said construction of the 4.15-mile streetcar in Santa Ana and Garden Grove should start late this year and called it “an exciting day” for the transit agency.

The streetcar will make 10 stops in each direction and will

connect the Santa Ana Regional Transportation Center to Harbor Boulevard and Westminster Avenue in Garden Grove.

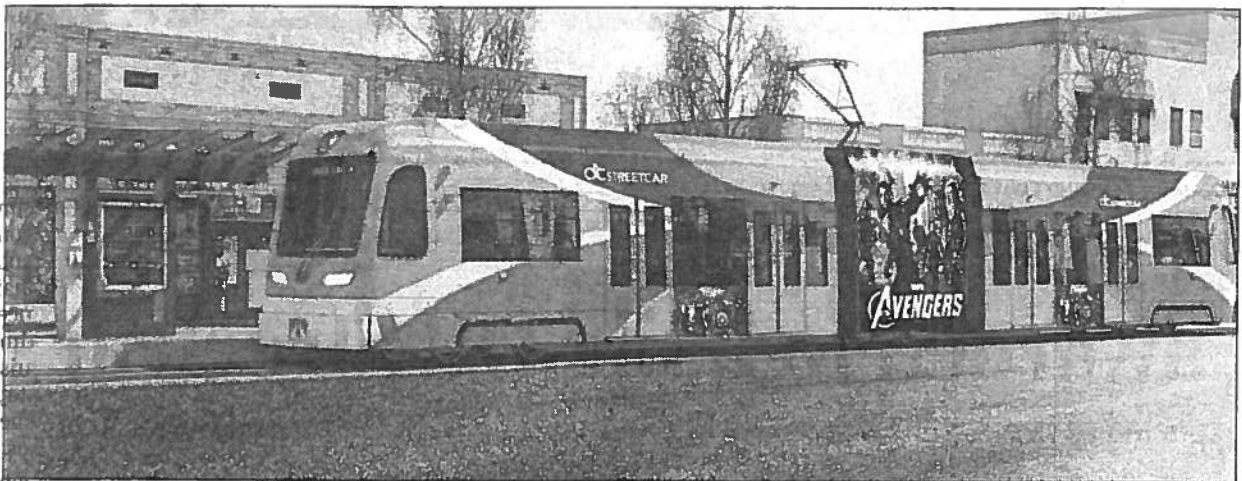
Before the vote, an attorney for disqualified bidder AECOM — whose bid was \$25 million less than Walsh’s — told the board the

company would take legal action if it did not win the bid. The attorney, Randy Finch, could not be reached for further comment after the meeting.

from about \$300 million last year to \$407.76 million this summer, a problem that has plagued similar projects around the country.

A gap of \$80 million between an earlier engineer’s estimate and the bid from

Walsh raised questions from several board members, but OCTA CEO Darrell Johnson attributed it to labor shortages, increasing costs for materials and other factors beyond the agency’s control.

Orange County Supervisor and OCTA board member Todd Spitzer also probed why AECOM’s bid was thrown out and was told an independent analysis backed up staff’s find-

ing that it failed to meet several federal funding requirements, specifically relating to hiring “economically disadvantaged” businesses as subcontractors.

Board member and Santa Ana Mayor Miguel Pulido noted the local cost of the project is about 41 percent, with the rest covered by federal and state funding. He said local governments end up funding about 80 per-

cent of typical transportation projects.

Aside from light rail-type projects in Los Angeles and San Diego, no cities in Orange County or the Inland area can boast a streetcar. Riverside officials considered one a few years ago, but that project appears stalled indefinitely after a preliminary study forecast low ridership and uncertain funding.

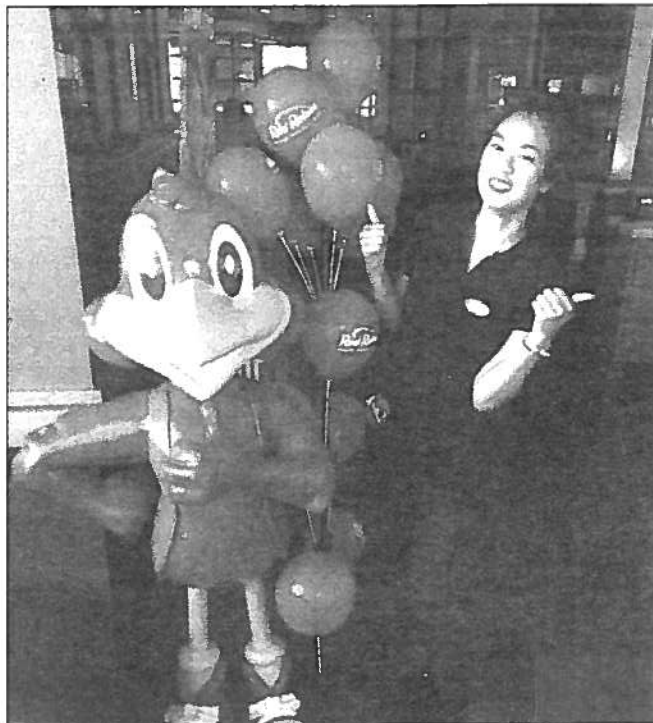

Police: Suspect fatally shot during attack

Witnesses report man
choking woman inside car

A 46-year-old man who was reportedly attacking a woman was shot by Garden Grove police last week.

The man, a transient who has not been named because the county coroner is trying to notify his kin, died that afternoon at an Orange County trauma center.

The woman, 43 and a Garden Grove resident, sustained minor injuries and was treated at a local hospital.

No officers were injured.

"The male suspect and female victim were known to each other and their exact relationship is being investigated," read a state-

ment by the police.

Witnesses first reported a domestic violence inside a Hyundai Sonata in the Ralph's parking lot at 12051 Euclid St. in Garden Grove on Sept. 18.

A Garden Grove police officer arrived about 3 p.m. and saw the struggle still going on inside the Sonata.

Witnesses said the man had his hands around the woman's neck, and that he continued attacking her after police arrived.

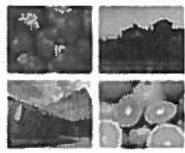

Fire discussion and perhaps vote on Oct. 9

More discussion and possibly a decision on whether to move fire and paramedic services from the city fire department to the Orange County Fire Authority is scheduled for the Oct. 9 meeting of the Garden Grove City Council.

On the motion by Councilmember Phat Bui, the council voted 7-0 on Tuesday night to urge city staff and other parties to make their top priority the creation of updated data on the potential switch to be brought back to the council.

(https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2016/07/gg-logo_jg-e1446082015536.jpg) Consideration of the agenda item went on for several hours, including recaps of earlier financial projections supplied by the city and the Garden Grove Firefighters Association, which is a main force behind the proposal to make the change.

The city's financial analyst has produced a report stating that over 10 years, the switch to the OCFa could cost the city up to an additional \$14.5 million. The GGFA countered with its own report arguing that, over time, the city would save \$10 million.

"We've got a \$24.5 million gap," said Mayor Steve Jones.



Timing of a decision of the possible transfer was a factor in the discussion. Voters on Nov. 6 will decide the fate of Measure O, a one-cent sales tax for Garden Grove to alleviate a looming financial crisis brought on by unfunded pension liability costs.

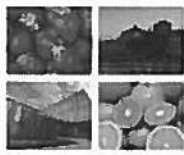
City Manager Scott Stiles described as “my worst nightmare” the possibility that the city incur additional costs, and then be in even worse shape if voters reject the measure. “It keeps me up at night.”

But Bui said, “I don’t want to wait one day” on making a decision on fire service, arguing that additional paramedic staffing – whether through the OCFA or a reorganized GGFD – could save lives.

Issues discussed included recruitment and retention, infrastructure, public sentiment, the OCFA’s attitude and how local control might be lost.

Also on Tuesday night, the council approved for first reading and introduction an ordinance establishing standards for outdoor dining along Main Street between Garden Grove Boulevard and Acacia Parkway.

Fast thinking isn't always smart

"A good plan executed in time beats a perfect plan executed too late." – Gen. George S. Patton.

"Act in haste, repent at leisure." – William Congreve.

I am never the first person to taste a newly-concocted soup dish offered to me. Someone else may jam that spoon in their mouth and spit out the liquid violently. "It's too effing hot!" he or she may say. "And it tastes awful!"

In my military days when we trained on clearing rooms in buildings that potentially sheltered bad guys, you never saw me first in. Discretion is the biggest part of my valor, such as it is.

(<https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2016/07/retorts.jpg>) Jim has always been very cautious, and it has kept my finger out of the pickle slicer. I don't jump off the roof into the pool. I don't eat ravioli from a can with a bulge (actually, you shouldn't eat ravioli from a can, ever) and if you want me to join me on your initial bungee jump off the bridge, well, no thanks. I am very comfortable down here.

That, perhaps, makes me a dull fellow. Well, on one particular instance, we need the Garden Grove City Council to be dull folks, at least for another five or six weeks.

The issue *de jour* is whether the city should trade in its 92-year-old fire department for a contract with the Orange County Fire Authority. It's been a bone of contention for months now, and endless meetings have been held, with bottomless financial arguments.

A city analyst says the move to OCEFA would cost the city \$14.5 million over 10 years; the firefighters union says, no, it would actually save \$10 million. That's a \$24.5 million difference of opinion.

While I have my own opinion on what the right decision is, I have no useful insights into the math. I can add, subtract, multiply and divide – even without a calculator – but get any more complicated than that and my eyes glaze over.

Polynomials? Get outta town. And who, exactly, is this Cal Culus fellow?

But I can figure out the difference between black and red ink. At present, the city is dipping into reserves to balance the budget. Some people insist on believing that, yes, water runs down hill but it will never reach the bottom.

Well, that dipper will be scraping the bottom pretty soon if additional funding doesn't appear. Measure O may be that cure.

Whether votes approve that 1-cent tax hike will decide a lot. If they do, then the city should have enough cash (an estimated \$19 million a year) to upgrade the GGFD's capabilities and even overlook some additional costs.

But if voters say no, "how many paramedics" may be the least of our problems. Westminster flirted with bankruptcy in 2016 before their voters bailed the city out.

My point is this: deciding which way to go with fire and paramedic services before we know whether we'll have enough money to turn on the lights in City Hall is folly.

You don't buy a new car until you know whether you got the job. You don't declare victory until the fat lady sings. And you don't rush to judgment before all the facts – and public input – are in.

Remember the old joke about what the policeman said to the driver he pulled over for speeding? "Hey, Mac, where's the fire?" There's not one yet, but if the council isn't willing to wait just a few weeks, we all could get burned.

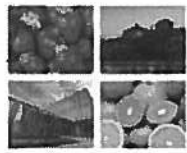

A fire Saturday night in Garden Grove claimed the lives of two people and did an estimated \$400,000 in damage.

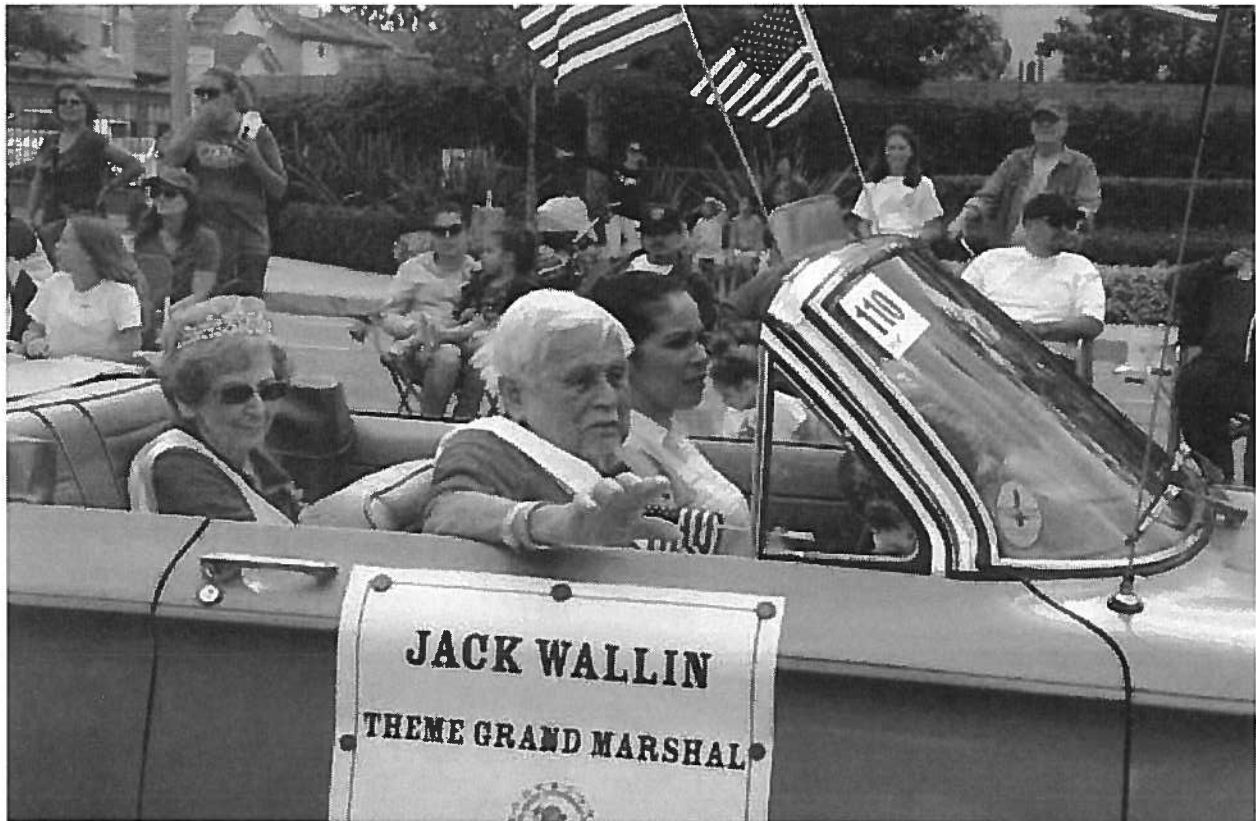

Jack Wallin, Strawberry Festival founder

Jack Wallin, one of the founders of the annual and popular Strawberry Festival in Garden Grove, passed away Friday night. According to sources close to the family, he was at Hoag Hospital in Newport Beach attended by relatives and friends at the time of his death at the age of 88.

Wallin was on the committee that established the event that succeeded the old Grovers' Day festival. The very first Strawberry Festival was held in 1958 as a tribute to what was at that time a major crop as Garden Grove made the transition from an agricultural town to a suburban city.

The festival is one of the largest community events in the western United States, and donates its earnings to non-profit groups and charities serving Garden Grove.

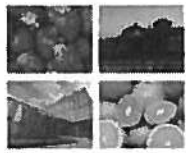
Wallin has served on the board of what is now the Strawberry Festival Association since its start, and has been active in many community organizations and agencies including the Kiwanis Club and Elks Lodge and the city's recreation and parks commission.

Possible switch to OCFA on agenda

The question of whether to contract with the Orange County Fire Authority to provide fire and paramedic services will again come before the Garden Grove City Council when it meets on Tuesday.

Replacing the current Garden Grove Fire Department – with roots in the community back to the 1920s – with the OCFA has been under consideration for several months. A proposal by the OCFA in March indicated that such a switch could save the city several million dollars, but an analysis by Garden Grove’s finance department predicted that – instead – it would cost up to \$15 million more over a 10-year period.



(https://orangecountytribune.files.wordpress.com/2016/07/gg-logo_lg.jpg)As an alternative, retiring Fire Chief Tom Schultz suggested a reorganization of the department that would upgrade paramedic service to match the OCFA model at a lower cost.

Since that report at a study session on Aug. 28, representatives of the city, the OCFA, the firefighters union, and others have been meeting. The agenda item recommends that the council consider several documents – including one from the Local 2005 (Garden Grove Firefighters Association).

In the latter instance, the GGFA seeks to make the case that figures don't take into account issues of morale, retention and recruitment in the department, as well as facility maintenance costs, and argues that the expense of raising salaries for firefighters to a level making it easier to recruit and retain qualified firefighters would make the OCFA proposal more cost-effective in the long run. The GGFA estimate is that the switch would save \$123,289 annually.

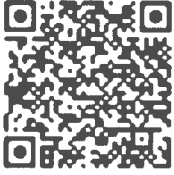

League-Sponsored Bond Agency Issues Nearly \$48 Million in Tax-Exempt Bonds for Affordable Housing in Oxnard and Morgan Hill

September 21, 2018

Some of the most significant benefits of League membership for cities since 1988 have flowed from the League's co-sponsorship of the California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA).

The California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA) announced the issuance of \$33,549,000 in tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds for Channel Island Park Apartments in Oxnard and \$14,000,000 in tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds for The Crossings on Monterey Apartments in Morgan Hill.

About Channel Island Park Apartments

Channel Island Park Apartments is the acquisition and rehabilitation of 152 multi-family affordable housing apartments by Channel Island Apartments, L.P. The project sponsor is DeSola Capital Group ("DeSola"). The project will continue to be 100 percent affordable and provide apartments to low-income residents in Oxnard.

CSCDA and DeSola partnered with JLL Capital Markets and Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe, LLP to provide the \$33,549,000 in tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds for the project. The project will undergo an extensive interior and exterior renovation ensuring that residents have an updated, safe, and affordable community to call home for years to come. The financing of the project will maintain the affordability of units for low-income tenants for 55 years.

About Crossings on Monterey Apartments

The Crossings on Monterey Apartments is the new construction of 39 affordable housing units by Urban Housing Communities (UHC). The benefits of the project for the City of Morgan Hill include the following:

- 100 percent of the affordable rental housing units will be rent restricted for low-income tenants;
- The project consists of five one-bedroom units, 18 two-bedroom units, 15 three-bedroom units, and a manager's unit; and
- All of the units will be restricted to households earning 60 percent or less of the area median income.

CSCDA and UHC partnered with Citibank and Orrick Herrington & Sutcliffe LLP to provide \$14,000,000 in tax-exempt multi-family affordable housing bonds for the project. The financing for the project requires the affordability of units for low-income tenants to be maintained for 55 years.

Prop. 6 Will Eliminate \$460 Million in Local Transportation Funding for the Chico/Redding Region

Dangerous Measure Jeopardizes 300 Road and Safety Projects

September 25, 2018

Chico area firefighters and local government leaders joined construction workers, activists and business leaders to oppose Proposition 6, the attack on bridge and road safety

The Sept. 25 event at the Knife River Construction Company in Chico was the latest in a series of press conferences being held throughout the state to voice strong opposition to Prop. 6.

In the north state Chico/Redding area alone, Prop. 6 would mean the loss of \$460 million in existing transportation funding that is being invested in bridge and road safety projects. Projects currently underway in the area include:

- Repairing and resurfacing 40.5 miles of county roads in Modoc County;
- Resurfacing more than 22 miles of I-5 near Red Bluff ;
- Pavement preservation project improving 21 miles of SR 299 near the town of Shasta; and
- Resurfacing 19.7 miles on SR 299 in Redding.



Chico Council Member Randall Stone has a professional background in

finance and warned of the risk that Prop. 6 poses to his community.

“Our area has experienced more than its share of devastating disasters in the past few years, so we also know how important it is to have a safe infrastructure during times of emergency. We need quality roads to safely evacuate residents and we need to make sure our bridges can withstand the pressures of fires and floods so that we aren’t cut off from services or stranded during disasters,” said Stone.

Jeff Brunson, a Chico firefighter, stressed the fact that first responders rely on sound roads to save lives. Fire professionals are not able fight a blazing wildfire or respond to a crisis if our roads and bridges can’t get us to the emergency, and evacuees rely on safe roads and bridges if wildfires do occur.

“Prop. 6 is a reckless step backward that turns back the clock on road and bridge safety, as well as public

safety. That's why firefighters stand united with local governments, engineers, and in asking voters to please protect public safety and VOTE NO on Prop. 6," said Brunson.

Santa Cruz Region Law Enforcement, Firefighters, Engineers and Local Government Join Labor and Community Groups to Oppose Prop. 6

Unless Voters Reject Prop. 6, Santa Cruz, Monterey and San Benito Counties Will Lose \$360 Million in Local Transportation Funding

September 26, 2018

In the second No on Prop. 6 press conference of the week, law enforcement, engineers, local government officials and community groups gathered in Santa Cruz on Sept. 26 to urge voters to reject the dangerous measure.

Prop. 6 will devastate the Santa Cruz, Monterey and San Benito region by eliminating over \$300 million in existing transportation funding. Projects like the following that are currently underway would be at risk:

- Roadway reconstruction and flooding prevention improvements on Branciforte Drive in Santa Cruz;
- Installing pedestrian safety features on the San Lorenzo Riverwalk;
- Securing up to nine new Clean Natural Gas buses for Santa Cruz METRO; and
- Revamping and updating eight bridges on Highway 1.

Standing in front of a much-needed anticipated bike and pedestrian overcrossing, Santa Cruz Council Member Cynthia Mathews warned about what is at stake on Nov. 6.

“We cannot afford to lose these important projects that would improve quality of life and help protect public safety,” said Council Member Matthews. “That’s why I stand here today, urging you to vote No on Prop. 6.”
