OBJECTIVE

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide a summary of meetings organized at the 2019 International Council of Shopping Centers Real Estate Convention (ICSC RECon) held annually in Las Vegas.

BACKGROUND

On May 19-22, 2019, the Office of Economic Development exhibited at the Public Private Partnership (P3) Pavilion at the ICSC RECon. Founded in 1957, ICSC is the premier global trade association for the shopping center and real estate industry. ICSC has more than 73,000 members from over 100 countries, which include shopping center owners, developers, managers, marketing specialists, investors, retailers, and brokers, as well as academics, public officials, and city exhibitors.

ICSC RECon is the largest conference of retail real estate professionals in the world. Attendance this year reached over 40,000 attendees representing retailers, retail brokers, developers, and investors. The exhibit space spanned over two million square feet with approximately 1,500 companies exhibiting in the Trade Exposition and Leasing Mall, a higher figure than last year.

This year, the Office of Economic Development team focused extensive efforts toward business attraction and expansion opportunities, along with many prescheduled meetings with investors, developers, and brokers seeking development opportunities in Garden Grove. One business retention priority is to maintain established relationships with local stakeholders. This was achieved through meetings held at the City's booth staffed by Garden Grove shopping center owners.

Also this year, ICSC RECon provided for many additional impromptu meetings with retailers and brokers interested in doing business in Garden Grove.

This year, there was increased activity with development interest in the Willowick 100-acre development opportunity and RFP. Several prescheduled meetings were held with major developers as a result of the proactive marketing and outreach to over 400 retailers and restaurants actively doing business in Southern California.

As with prior years, there continues to be a strong optimistic interest from retailers, restaurants, and hoteliers to locate in Garden Grove, as well as a strong interest in the Willowick RFP.

At ICSC RECon, a number of strategic meetings were planned with key stakeholders including:

Shopping Center Owners and Retailers

Red Mountain Group (Owner of the Smart and Final and Gold's Gym) – The new Gold's Gym and Smart and Final are performing exceptionally well.

Garden Promenade – The ownership highlighted the recent success of the Garden Promenade Shopping Center with updates on new tenants performing well, such as Blaze Pizza, Wingstop, Chipotle, Yogurtland, Panda Express, Paris Baguette, and Aldi Food Market.

Sterling Organization (Owner of Pavilions Plaza West) - Sterling Organization acquired the former Vons Pavilion's at 9852 Chapman Avenue. Sterling shared their efforts to reposition this property with new retail and restaurant uses.

Target - Met with the retailer's representative and discussed a significant renovation planned for the Harbor Boulevard location.

CBRE – Met with the broker representing the West Grove Center and discussed future reuse of the bowling alley property.

Hoteliers

Hilton Hotels - Hilton representatives discussed the Hilton Home2 Suites brand, which the BN group has secured for 13560 Harbor Boulevard, and other emerging Hilton hotel brands that may be considered in the Grove Resort District.

Intercontinental Hotel Group (IHG) – IHG officials discussed new hotel brands available for the Grove Resort District.

Hyatt - Representatives from Hyatt Hotels discussed their hotel brands available for development on Harbor Boulevard.

Developers

Hopkins Real Estate Group – Discussions focused on development opportunities for infill housing and retail developments.

Pacific Retail Partners – Discussions took place about development opportunities and sites that have been listed for sale and for redevelopment.

Festival Companies - Discussions focused on City-wide development opportunities.

Regency Centers – Presented development opportunities in Garden Grove including target areas of West Garden Grove and Downtown areas.

SUMMARY

ICSC RECon continues to be an extremely successful and productive means of promoting Garden Grove as a dynamic destination for investment. There was a significant amount of retail traffic at the City of Garden Grove's ICSC P3 exhibit booth and staff realized over forty five (45) meetings with investors, developers, and commercial real estate brokers. In the coming weeks, staff will re-engage with commercial brokers and retail contacts established at the conference, and schedule follow-up meetings and site tours with potential developers.





Identity released of second person killed in crash of teen-filled car

SILVERADO » A 17-year-old Bolsa Grande High School baseball varsity baseball player was the second victim to die on Saturday when a sedan veered off a road in Silyerado and struck a tree.

The passenger, Colton Mondy of Garden Grove, was identified Sunday morning by the Orange County Coroner's office. He and the driver of a 1998 Mazda Protege, Joshua Morales, 19, of Santa Ana, died when the vehicle traveled off of Santiago Canyon Road, through a barbed wire fence and into the tree, the California Highway Patrol said.

Three other passengers were hospitalized with major injuries. The were identified by the CHP as Daniel Clark, 18, of Santa Ana; Luis Hernandez, 19, of Garden Grove; and Bolsa Grande softball player Unique Valdez, 18, of Garden Grove.

The crash in the area of Santiago Canyon Road south of Hicks Haul Road occurred just before 2:25 a.m. on Saturday, according to the CHP. Coroner's investigator Kelly Keyes said Mondy died at 6:48 a.m. Saturday at UCI Medical Center. She did not know where Mondy had been sitting in the car.

Morales was found dead inside of the wrecked Mazda, the CHP said in a news release. The Protege was heading northbound on Santiago Canyon Road when for an unknown reason, it left the road. It was not clear how fast the car was going. But crews had to pry the sedan from the "We haven't even had tree along the dark road

to pull the driver out, Orange County Fire Authority Battalion Chief Craig Covey told KTLA.

Relatives, friends, teammates and teachers reeled over news of Mondy's death, Terranove said. He described him as a polite, happy-go-lucky teen who was well known among his classmates, though he had only recently transferred to Bolsa Grande from Mater Dei this past fall semester. The student-athlete had a passion for baseball, and played every position except short-stop, according to the coach.

"He was the best athlete on the team by far," said Terranove. "And, there's nobody on our team who didn't like that guy."

Valdez was recovering from surgery at Mission Hospital Sunday Morning, where members of her softball team and Bolsa Grande staff had visited her over the weekend. She served as a teacher's assistant for one of Terranove's history classes, and was days away from graduating.









Police are searching for two suspects involved in the shooting of a man late Wednesday night in Garden Grove.

According to Sgt. Nick Jensen of the GGPD, the incident took place around 10:48 p.m. in the area of McMains Street and Enloe Way. The victim was a 50-year-old Garden Grove resident.

The suspect had fled the scene southbound in a vehicle described as a dark-colored "box-style" vehicle similar to a Toyota Scion.

The victim told police that he had been confronted by a suspect who brandished a gun and demanded property. He was shot after refusing to comply. After receiving first aid from police, he was taken to a local hospital with what were described as "non-life threatening injuries."



The two suspects being sought are:

- a male Hispanic, about 5-foot, 10-inches tall, with a thin build. He was wearing a blue button-up flannel shirt, pants, a hat and a bandana covering his face;
- the driver of the vehicle, no description.

CalRecycle to Release Revised Draft Regulations on June 18 for New Organic Waste Diversion Regulations

Cities Should Plan to Review and Comment by July 3

The California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) will present new revised draft regulations of the <u>SB 1383 Short-Lived Climate Pollutants regulations</u> at a public workshop on June 18 in Diamond Bar. This workshop will also be webcast.

The 15-day formal public comment period will begin the following day and run from June 19 – July 3.

These regulations stem from <u>SB 1383 (Lara, 2016)</u>, which requires the reduction of short-lived climate pollutants, such as methane. This bill tasks CalRecycle with implementing programs to achieve a statewide goal of diverting 50 percent of organic waste from landfills by 2020 and 75 percent by 2025.

Over the last two years CalRecycle conducted informal regulatory proceedings. Most recently, CalRecycle released draft <u>regulations</u> in January 2019.

The League submitted <u>comments</u> on Feb. 13 based on the January 2019 draft, and encourages cities to review the January 2019 draft regulations before the revised regulations are released.

Legislature Still Considering Multiple Alternative Proposals for Safe Drinking Water

Governor Gavin Newsom's May budget <u>proposal</u> to place a tax on water to fund clean drinking water across the state failed to advance in a Senate Budget Subcommittee.

Instead, the Senate Budget Subcommittee voted to adopt <u>new budget trailer bill</u> language that would continuously appropriate \$150 million from the state's General Fund to a Safe Drinking Water fund proposed in and contingent upon the passage of <u>SB 200 (Monning)</u>.

While the water tax budget proposal failed in the Senate, the Assembly is still considering AB 217 (Garcia, E), which still contains a tax on water. The League remains **Opposed Unless Amended** to any proposals that place a tax on water, and will continue to monitor these proposals as they advance.

Overview on the Water Tax

Over the last several years, providing safe drinking water throughout California has been a priority of the Legislature. In 2017, Sen. Monning introduced <u>SB 623 (Monning)</u>, which first addressed the creation of a safe, affordable, drinking water fund. That bill ultimately died in 2018 after being rolled into a budget trailer bill, however the Legislature vowed to address the issue in the future.

This year, Governor Gavin Newsom came out strong on providing clean, safe, affordable drinking water for all Californians, including such a proposal in both his <u>January</u> and <u>May</u> budget proposals.

The Governor's May budget proposal included a monthly tax on residential water users and the establishment of "Safe Drinking Water Fees" for dairies, fertilizer users and various animal farmers. The language was adapted from <u>SB 623</u> and associated budget trailer bill, which intended to fund clean water programs by imposing a new statewide tax on water, as well as fertilizer and dairy fees.

The Governor's trailer bill fee seeks to generate an estimated \$100 to \$110 million annually, which would be utilized for the refurbishment of California's failing water systems.

The League, along with a broad coalition of nearly 200 local water and public agencies <u>opposed the proposed water tax unless amended</u>, arguing that an alternative funding source, such as the water trust fund in <u>SB 669 (Caballero)</u>, was a better choice than a tax on water.

With hundreds of state-regulated water systems throughout the state not meeting safe drinking water standards, an estimated one million Californians are exposed to harmful chemicals in their drinking water.

With the failure of <u>SB 669</u>, the League is supportive of the Senate's rejection of the Governor's trailer bill language in favor of an alternative funding source than levying a tax on water. It is clear that this issue is a priority for the Legislature and Governor this year, as the League anticipates a deal will come together on this later this session.

Next Steps

The League is encouraged by the development of a potential budget deal on an alternative funding source than a tax on water to address the issue of safe drinking water and will continue to monitor the various proposals through the legislative process.

League Legislative Update - Top Bills Affecting Local Control The League urges cities to take action on top ten bills of concern

As the legislative cycle progresses, the League is closely monitoring a number of bills that would greatly impact cities, and are working hand-in-hand with our Members to stand up for city interests.

Last week, the League of California Cities hosted a briefing on the status of budget discussions and major bills that continue to threaten local control or are beneficial to cities. While action by the policy and appropriations committees have reduced some of the threats this legislative season, city officials need to remain focused as bills pass out of their house of origin and budget negotiations accelerate.

The League webinar highlighted the top ten bills that severely impact local control, and called on cities to take action on these measures.

These bills are arranged by issue area and include the following:

- 1. SB 330 (Skinner) Housing Crisis Act of 2019.
- 2. AB 1763 (Chiu) Density Bonus. Affordable Housing.
- 3. SB 13 (Wieckowski) Accessory Dwelling Units.
- 4. AB 1356 (Ting) Cannabis. Local Jurisdictions. Retail Commercial Cannabis Use.
- 5. AB 516 (Chiu) Authority to Remove Vehicles.
- 6. AB 392 (Weber) Peace Officers. Deadly Force.
- 7. AB 1400 (Kamlager Dove) Workers' Compensation. Fire Service Personnel.
- 8. SB 542 (Stern) Workers' Compensation. Presumption.
- 9. AB 849 (Bonta) Elections. Local Redistricting.
- 10. <u>SB 162 (Galgiani)</u> Extension of California Alternative Energy and Advanced Transportation Financing Authority. Sales and Use Taxes.
